## Part 2: Description

This module will introduce you to professional assistant costume supervisor practices within the theatre environment through working with professional theatre staff, tutors and other students to learn the etiquette of the backstage environment. You will learn how to provide the appropriate costume and effect quick changes in limited space under show conditions. You will attend the read through and technical rehearsals of all BOVTS productions which you are assigned to and will work with the script to produce a dressing plot.

During the year you will have many opportunities to attend fittings and make alterations to costumes for public performances. You will be able to work on a number of School productions, each lasting normally for a period of ten days in a professional Theatre environment such as the Bristol Old Vic and the Tobacco factory.

Part of your learning is carried out within a Costume Hire environment and professional theatre space with tutors and theatre staff. You will have access to the school's own costume store and will learn how to size costumes correctly to fit actors and the correct handling and care of costumes. You will gain experience in shopping for shows and when necessary sampling fabrics, and budgeting skills. You will receive tuition and guidance in the methods of alteration and the use of industrial machinery where appropriate. You are also taught safe working practices within the workroom and the laundry room, receiving instruction in the safe handling of equipment, including washing machines, spinners, industrial steam irons and tumble dryers and drying cupboards.

Scheduled learning includes practical classes and workshops, work-based learning, project supervision and supervised time in studios. Independent learning includes assignment preparation and engagement in appropriate background research for the shows chosen by the school.

## Part 3: Assessment

You will be assessed on the fulfilment of the role of an assistant costume supervisor. Particular account will be taken of contribution to the team, the ability to respond to the requirements of the costume supervisor and designer and your ability to safely handle Industrial machinery in the care, handling and alterations of costumes.
