Part 3: Assessment			
Assessment Strategy	Component A		
	This assessed group presentation tests students' ability to work in teams, to develop critically nuanced arguments, and to demonstrate excellent presentation skills. Students also practice their multimedia skills through the use of tools such as PowerPoint and Prezzi.		
	Component B		
	Critical Intervention: this assignment offers students the opportunity to test their critical, analytical skills. They complete either a 2000 word close reading essay or they design a book jacket in conjunction with a 1000 word critical rationale.		
	 The Independent Study requires students to develop their own essay question with staff guidance. Students have to write on three texts, one of which may be a film. This final assignment allows students to develop their own independent, critical approach to the module texts and themes.
