Part 2: Description

Features: Module Entry Requirements: No specific requirements for students on programmes. CPD students: based on the academic/professional judgement of the PG Transport Programme Leader on an individual applicant basis.

Educational Aims: Through study of this module, students will develop a critical appreciation of the context and process of transport policy-making, including the social, economic and environmental objectives policymakers seek to create for the transport sector and the political,

financial and socio-cultural constraints under which they operate, and the mechanisms by which policy changes. Consideration is given to the acceptability of policy and the differential implications policy has for the range of citizens and institutions which make up society. The module also embraces the implications of technological change.

Outline Syllabus: Transport sector governance and regulation with examples drawn from bus, rail, road.

Financing transport projects.

Key concepts in transport policy: integration, social inclusion, sustainable mobility.

Transport interest groups and social groups, including the ageing impaired travellers.

Policy and plan-making tools and procedures, including accessibility planning, public engagement, and understanding good and bad practice.

Understanding how and why transport policy changes.

New transport technologies and managing transport-sector change.

Teaching and Learning Methods: The module has six themed contact days through which students build up the expertise necessary to respond to the assessment briefs. All sessions will be interactive and one session per day will take a more student-led format, with particular perspectives presented or expertise shared (for example in respect of international contexts).

Part 3: Assessment

Component A1 (Learning Outcomes 1 – 5).

Individual Presentation and Oral Examination.

In the oral exam the student will make a brief presentation based on the report, but will be briefed to then expect questions on the report or any aspect of the syllabus.

Component B1 (Learning Outcomes 1 – 5).

Individual Report 3000 words.

Students will develop a report based on their module learnings. The task will have high professional relevance, requiring them to recommend a solution to a policy problem that will involve demonstrating a sophisticated understanding of the problem and how the proposed solution will fit into the existing regulatory-legal context, and how it will be financed or funded. Moreover, the report will need to consider the needs of different users of the transport system. Hence all learning outcomes will be addressed.

Plagiarism will be designed out through the student being asked to provide an individual response to the problem, and that report then being presented orally.

Whilst no formative assessment is proposed, students will have opportunities to share their ideas in class and to receive feedback both in the group context or in individual discussions with the module team.

Resit assessment will require students to re-submit the individual report and defend it in an individual presentation with oral examination.
