Learning Outcomes	Part 2: Learning and Teaching On successful completion of this module students will be able to have an appreciation of and be able to demonstrate: 1. familiarity with immigration law, practice and procedure 2. practical skills in the preparation of representations for both emergency situations and tribunal hearings 3. an understanding of the law relating to immigration appeals

Syllabus Outline Syllabus outline: Refugee & Asylum Law depends on an extensive familiarity with tribunal procedures and rules. The course was designed and organised to account for the quantity of research that the students undertook prior to each small group session (SGS). Teaching will concentrate on the dissemination of knowledge of immigration and nationality law and the practicalities of advising clients in this area of law. The small group session workshop format within the three-hour session will include role-play, drafting letters, completing relevant forms and documents for and on behalf of clients, as well as oral representation exercises. The students will cover: • Refugee, Asylum and Exceptional Leave Deportation, illegal entry and removal Detention and bail Emergency situations Immigration appeals Large Group Session LGS 1 – Introduction to Immigration and Asylum Law **Small Group Sessions** SGS 1 – Principles and procedure of Asylum Law. Case study. Teaching and Learning Methods	The Refugee & Asylum Option is taught over six face to face sessions and one introductory LGS.
	Students have access to a large amount of supporting material on Blackboard. Suggested answers to the written exercises are posted onto Blackboard.
	The students learn the Refugee & Asylum law skills through their application of knowledge gained from:-
	directed self study on the statutes, rules and procedure,
	handouts provided by the subject tutor,
	The small group session workshop format within the 3.5hrsession will include role-play, drafting letters, completing relevant forms and documents for and on behalf of clients, as well as oral representation exercises.
	tutor led written and oral feedback (incorporated in SGSs),
	self and peer review (incorporated into SGSs),
	the practice assessment.
	Students are also expected to engage in independent learning including hours engaged with essential reading, case study preparation, assignment preparation and completion.
	Students will consolidate their learning by reflecting on their work and the feedback given by tutor and colleagues.
Reading Strategy	Students will be expected to undertake pre-reading of materials prepared by the course tutor and contained in the course materials booklet which will be distributed prior to the commencement of the option. The pre-reading materials are designed to encourage students to review legal concepts underpinned the law of immigration. Additionally students will be expected to supplement this reading by reference to the research sources listed below.

Part 3: Assessment

Assessment Strategy

In preparation for the assessment the students are provided with assessment criteria which is included in their introductory information.

Students are introduced to the structure and intended outcomes of a conference with a professional client in the practice assessment. In SGS 5/6 they undertake a practice assessment in replication of the final assessment, though with individual feedback immediately following their performance.

There is one component which must be passed/complied with:

- 1. The assessment will consist of a conference exercise requiring the preparation of a skeleton conference plan where the student was acting for the appellant in the appeal.
- 2. Students have 20 minutes to advise their client, the appellant, in conference.
- 2. The students must prepare and submit a written component, the conference plan.
- 3. There will also be some client intervention.
- The assessment case study is sent to students one week before the assessment.
- 5. Students must ensure there are no fatal flaw errors in understanding. These will be determined by the team tutors at the time of the assessment but will involve a failure to appreciate some fundamental law/misunderstanding about how to advise on a case in their clients best interests.
