Part 2: Description

This module will introduce students to key themes and debates in the criminology and sociology of legal and illegal drugs. It will engage with a wide range of topics from changing patterns of use and dependency and drug related problems to national and international drug markets. The module draws on a range of theoretical and conceptual ideas to understand the nature of drugs, their use and regulation. Topics will include;

- Theories of drug use, misuse and dependency
- Role of gender, age, class and ethnicity in drug use and culture
- Relationship between drugs, drug cultures and crime
- Local, national and international drug markets
- National and international drug policy
- · Policing of drug markets
- Treatment and control of drug users

Lectures and seminars will place these topics in their proper historical, political, scientific and cultural contexts. In the seminars, student will be expected to have covered assigned material, and to participate in group activities to explore key concepts and issues.

Part 3: Assessment

The assessment strategy for this module aims to measure the skills and levels of knowledge and understanding

achieved by students through a range of assessment types. The assessments types on this module were selected in order to contribute to the development of key L2 skills and module learning outcomes. They were also selected in response to student feedback and to contribute to the diversity of assessment methods on the programme as a whole. The module adheres to UWE Academic Regulations and Assessment Cycle Policy, and assessment and feedback will form a critical aspect of the students learning process in line with UWE's Assessment Cycle Policy and will follow UWE's inclusivity guidance.

Assessment criteria used for each assessment strategy will be provided for students via Blackboard.

Summative assessments

Plan of Case Study (750 words): Students will submit a plan of their case study of a legal or illegal drug. The plan will include a detailed plan of their case study and full references of five key academic sources that will be used in the final version of the case study. This plan will provide students with an opportunity to prepare and receive instructive feedback on their actual case study. This assessment will also provide students with an opportunity to further demonstrate L2 academic skills. It will cover learning outcomes 1-2 and 4-5.

Case Study (2500 words): Students will prepare and submit a case study of a legal or illegal drug. The Case Study assessment will provide students with an opportunity to develop an awareness, knowledge and understanding of key themes and issues relating to a particular drug including history, patterns of use, related problems and regulation. This will cover learning outcomes 1-5.

Viva (10-15 minute): The viva will be under controlled conditions and is directed towards developing the knowledge and understanding that the student demonstrated in the case study. Areas to be explored in the viva, through a series of questions, are identified in the case study feedback. This will cover learning outcomes 1-5.

Formative assessments and feedback

Seminar and tutorial activities provide students with activities and opportunities to assess their progress on the module. Feedback on progress is provided by the seminar tutor.

Plagiarism strategy
