**Syllabus Outline:**

In this module students are required to develop a substantial and coherent body of work that demonstrates understanding of their own practice and career aspirations. It is intended to synthesise the complexity of the key benchmarks for Art and Design students and equip them with the fundamental skills expected of such a graduate. This could be demonstrated in one major piece of work or several shorter pieces united by a common theme. The form that the final work takes is not restricted, but should be appropriate to discourse of photography. Negotiations take place with subject tutors to ensure that learning outcomes can be met fully and that the project is sustainable over the time-span of the module. With tutorial support, students devise and plan their own programme of work using the proposal developed during the previous preparatory module. The proposal, which may undergo significant changes as the module progresses, allows the student to demonstrate fully the application of a personal methodology in photographic practice.

**Teaching and Learning Methods:**

Students will be allocated a tutor group in which regular tutorials will take place to monitor the progress of work and offer critical feedback. In addition students will be able to consult a range of staff during the module and sign-up tutorials will be offered to maximise staff input on individual projects. This is further supported through presentations scheduled as formative assessment points during the module. Students are also encouraged to take advantage of the guest speaker programme (organised through the *Professional Practice* module); not only for lecture information, but also through follow-up tutorials they may offer to review student work. In conjunction with the *Professional Practice* module, portfolio surgeries with staff will be offered to help students prepare both for assessment and employment/postgraduate interviews. Assessment is through project work and supporting research according to a student authored but negotiated brief. A mandatory research file reports the student's progress throughout the module according to their key research areas, it should however also be used as an active experimental and problem-solving tool.
