Part 2: Description

Educational aims: The student will become expert-like in their focused research area. They will be confident in applying evidence to outlining an answer to a research question that they have identified.

Outline syllabus: As the capstone module, the dissertation module builds on a set of research skills that students have developed in their first two years of study. However, the module does include some taught elements that will typically cover:

- * Research design, planning and writing.
- * Literature review and synthesis work including search techniques and correct citation/referencing techniques
- * Construction and/or curation of wide range of evidence sources appropriate for the research question including ideas of what constitutes "good quality" research evidence.
- * Advanced use of analytical techniques appropriate to an Economics dissertation that might focus either on quantitative (statistical/econometric) or qualitative methods (or mixed method study) depending on the research question identified.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The dissertation is a module where students are expected to direct their own learning in putting together the final submission. To support students frame their independent enquiry, there are two means of facilitating their work:

- (1) through a structure of "taught" sessions where general research issues are discussed and where students are directed towards the questions they need to talk through with their supervisors. These sessions focus on research design and literature review work in semester 1 and they move onto research analysis issues in semester 2. These sessions include a session from colleagues in the Library outlining resources available to dissertation students.
- (2) through 6 meetings over two semesters students organise with a supervisor. Research supervisors are staff who are familiar with the processes of doing research in Economics (as a broad, pluralistic family or sub-disciplines).

Students are encouraged to explore and choose their approach from a range of

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methodological approaches. The topic chosen will be informed by previous study and/or may be based on a current or past workplace setting. The focus of the project MUST be agreed with the supervisor and should be relevant to each

individual student's award.

Students needs to demonstrate independent problem solving skills as well as being

able to manage their time on this task.

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Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: This module requires the students to write an 8000 word

dissertation as the final piece of summative work. At the final submission point,

students may be given the opportunity for a viva voci exam (either in person or

online). The mark given to the final submission is worth 75% of the total mark.

To support the student building towards the final dissertation students will also be

asked to submit a 2000 word research proposal that will include a literature review,

an outline conceptualisation of their research puzzle based on their literature review

and an outline research design. This proposal is both formative (towards the final

submission) but it is also summative (in that the mark is part of the module score).

The proposal document is worth 25% of the final mark.

Assessment components:

Dissertation (First Sit)

Description: 8000 word dissertation that includes the identification of a core research

question, a critical evaluation of existing literature, a research design, analysis and

conclusions. This includes a (short) statement of how research reflects on one or

both of structural inequality and/or sustainability.
