Part 2: Description

Overview: This module examines the laws, and law-making and adjudicative institutions of the World Trade Organisation.

Particular attention is given to the procedures for dispute resolution in respect of GATT and other 'covered agreements' relating to international economic law, and the jurisprudence arising.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The main focus of teaching and learning on the taught LLM programme is through independent research and debate in the context of 2 hour weekly workshops.

The workshop-based approach to teaching and learning is designed to enable the student to develop the independent research, analytical and reflective skills required for successful completion of a postgraduate level course.

Page 3 of 7 21 July 2023 Students will need to complete the necessary preparatory reading and study of any set case materials in advance of each workshop.

From each workshop, the student will be expected to have developed a general mastery of the subject under consideration.

In addition, students will be expected to contribute to structured analytical discussions, raise, critically assess and defend different points of view on controversial issues in class and to make presentations to the class on their own and in groups.

Analytical skills and a critical theoretical approach to the subject are encouraged.

A strong emphasis is placed on independent engagement with the materials and the questioning of assumptions concerning human rights as categories.

Students should come prepared to be fully involved in lively debate and engagement with each other and the tutor.

The written assessment assesses a different skill; that of writing clearly and precisely in an area of law relevant to the module. Here, the student should write in a clear and structured manner with appropriate content. The assessment also gives the student an opportunity to conduct further research, with an extensive bibliography

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and detailed footnotes.
