Part 2: Description

This module provides an introduction to the structure of English and other languages. It covers the fields of morphology, syntax and language typology. The module includes practical exercises, working with language data. At the end of the module students should have an understanding of the grammatical structures of English and other languages, be able to carry out linguistic analyses for specific grammatical structures and have a general understanding of how the languages of the world differ/are similar at the structural level.

Part 3: Assessment

The assessment is constructed to enable students to achieve the learning outcomes of the module. TB1 hosts a portfolio assessment, in which students explore small chunks of various types of assessment. The tasks for the portfolio will be set each year by the module leader, and can include, for example, a 500-1000 word report on fieldwork, a morphological analysis, or a visualisation of a grammatical concept. This type of assessment gives students the chance to explore learning and assessment strategies at level 1. It also helps to reduce plagiarism

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by setting (different) specific tasks for each year-group.

The second teaching block assessment is a final exam, which tests the subject knowledge and analytical skills acquired throughout the module. This type of assessment ensures that students have met the required learning outcomes and engage with the subject contents throughout the module run.

During the entire modules, students will have opportunities to test their learning and to engage in formative assessment procedures, such as through exercises and mock exams (with feedback from the tutor).

- TB1: a portfolio coursework, consisting (for example) of a 500-1000 word report on fieldwork, a morphological analysis and a visualisation of a grammatical concept (Component B)
- TB2: a 2-hour exam relating specifically to elements learnt in TB2, based on elements introduced in TB1 (Component A).
