Part 2: Description

Students will gain an understanding of different journalistic writing skills as well as how to put them to use looking at the social, political and sectors within Bristol.

They will be introduced to key areas such as media law and regulation as well as the civic institutions of which journalism is both participant and watchdog.

Among the production skills which will be covered through practical exercises will be web-based research, feature writing, illustrating articles, interviewing skills and content management systems.

Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

COMPONENT A1: Portfolio 65%

Students will be required to produce a portfolio of journalistic output including a feature article laid out appropriately with illustrations in Adobe InDesign and a detailed workbook.

COMPONENT A2: Exam 25%

They will also be required to pass an examination about civil society structures, the court and criminal justice system, including a short essay relating to current media law and regulation.
