Part 2: Description

Overview: This module explores contemporary patterns, issues and policy on migration in the UK and EU, and with reference to other case studies from selected countries, e.g. USA and India.

Features: Module Entry Requirements Students must have 60 credits at level 1.

Educational Aims: In addition to the Learning Outcomes the educational experience may explore, develop, and practise but not formally discretely assess the following: group work, debate, role play, report writing, academic posters, evaluation of website materials.

Outline Syllabus: Part 1 Nation-states, borders and mobilities

This section introduces the module's core concepts of nation-states, borders, nationality, identity, and international migration; motivations for and patterns of migration; types of migrants (e.g. refugees, asylum seekers, illegal, economic and elite migrants). UK and EU migration policies: border control, government management of migrants, people smuggling.

Part 2 Migrant experience and representation of migrants

Using a variety of sources including reports, biography and fiction, this block explores the experience of migration and its impact on identity, with reference to gender, age, ethnicity, migrant-generation etc.. An examination of the impact of migrants on services (e.g. NHS and housing). This is linked to analysis of representation of migrants in the UK media.

Part 3 Migration as lifestyle mobility

This section examines migration and lifestyle through case studies of retirement migration (e.g. UK to Spain), economic and 'quality of life' migrants (e.g. UK to Australia, Poland to UK) and elite business migrants (e.g. UK - Hong Kong). To include debate on the right to migrate.

Teaching and Learning Methods: Students will receive an average of three hours of contact time per week e.g. lectures combined with seminars or group work, with some field visits and tutorials.

This module uses a variety of methods for teaching and learning.

Scheduled learning will include lectures, self-directed learning activities, documentaries, seminars, tutorials, analysis of news reports and government policy.

Independent learning includes hours engaged with essential reading, case study preparation, assignment preparation and completion etc. At the end of each week's lecture students will be given set self-directed learning. Students are expected to spend approximately 4 hours a week on independent study for this module. Further research and preparation time will be required for assessment.

Assessment will be set on the assumption you have undertaken this work. You are also expected to undertake independent reading and research for assessed coursework.

Part 3: Assessment

This module focuses on developing research and critical writing skills and so it is assessed by a seen exam (Component A).

Questions will be provided four weeks prior to the examination to allow focused research and revision. The exam will be structured requiring students to answer questions with reference to ideas and reading in the wider module.

Guidance and feedback on skills development (note taking and referencing, essay plans and mock exam questions etc.) will be provided through selected self-directed learning and class activities, resulting in formative (non-assessed) feedback.

Summative assessment Component A: Seen examination (2 hours) Learning outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Formative feedback Formative feedback will be in the form of discussion and activities based on set readings and exercises as the module progresses.
