Part 2: Description

Overview: This module employs a geopolitical outlook on migration, states policies, and experiences of migrants.

Features: Module Entry Requirements: Students must have 60 credits at Level 1.

Educational Aims: The module considers policy decision making of states and investigates reasons for cooperation and/or conflict between states with regards to migration. The module then goes on to explore the links between domestic politics, state behaviour and the move towards global migration governance. Framed by geopolitical reasoning, students will consider and challenge states decision making and its impact on the international normative commitments to the rights of migrants.

Outline Syllabus: The module will broadly cover topics such as:

The geopolitics of the international refugee regime

The geopolitics of open borders

Statelessness and the international law

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Displacement and geopolitics of climate change refugees

Human smuggling and trafficking

Securitisation of migration

The negotiation of the Global Refugee and Migration Compacts as a means of addressing the global refugee crisis

The nexus between migration and urban planning

Teaching and Learning Methods: This module uses a variety of methods for teaching and learning. Scheduled learning will include lectures, selfdirected learning activities, documentaries, seminars, tutorials, analysis of news reports and government policy.

Independent learning includes hours engaged with essential reading, case study preparation, assignment preparation and completion, etc. At the end of each week's lecture students will be given set self-directed learning.

Students are expected to spend approximately 4 hours a week on independent study for this module. Further research and preparation time will be required for assessment.

Part 3: Assessment

Written assignment (position statement); (Component A; Learning Outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6) - this piece of assessment requires a student to write a position statement on a migration policy related to a topic of their choice and covered on the module. The goal of the assignment is to convince the reader that their position on a chosen policy is valid and defensible.

Students are required to:

policy under consideration.

- choose a relevant issue
- identify a policy aimed at tackling the issue
- state and develop your argument on the policy
- organize your statement in a clear and logical manner

Students must identify one side of the argument and persuade the reader that they have well-founded knowledge of the policy being discussed. Students are required to support their argument with evidence to ensure the validity of their claims, as well as to refute the counterclaims to show that they are well informed about both sides. Informed and evidenced by discussion, students are required to provide a set of recommendations to enhance the

Formative feedback will be in the form of discussion and activities based on set readings and exercises as the module progresses.

The resit requires: resubmission of written assignment (Component A), taking into account feedback on the first sits (where appropriate).
