<p>Overview: Co-requisites: Any undergraduate design studio module within the following degrees:</p> <p>BEng (Hons) Architecture and Environmental Engineering</p> <p>BA (Hons) Architecture and Planning, BA (Hons) Interior Architecture</p> <p>BSc (Hons) Architecture, BSc(Hons) Architecture Technology and Design</p> <p>MDes Architecture and Planning, MEng Architecture and Environmental Engineering</p> <p>Educational Aims: See Learning Outcomes</p> <p>Outline Syllabus: The module will contribute to students' knowledge and understanding of:</p> <p>the cultural, social and intellectual histories, theories and technologies that influence the design of buildings; the histories and theories of architecture and the related arts, technologies and human sciences; how the theories, practices and technologies of the arts influence architectural design; the creative application of the fine arts and their relevance and impact on architecture; and the module will develop an ability to evaluate evidence, arguments and assumptions in order to make and present sound judgements within a structured discourse relating to architectural</p>

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culture, theory and design.

The module is structured chronologically. Broadly, each lecture in the first semester will be devoted to a key architectural movement up until the end of the 19th century, and those in semester 2 to later key architectural movements. This structure means that more emphasis is placed on more recent movements, with particular emphasis on the emergence of modernism.

Students are required to provide themselves with a sketchbook for exclusive use in this module. Great emphasis is placed on attendance at lectures so that students can learn the discipline of recording visual information (sketching) from the pace of projected slides and commentaries. Sketchbooks will be collected at the end of semester 1 and returned with formative feedback. They will be collected again at the final session for summative feedback.

It is emphasised throughout that this is not an assessment in sketching ability, but in understanding and recording visual information.

The written element of 1,500 words (with illustrations) will give students experience in making a piece of properly referenced academic writing that engages with the discipline of architectural history, and which reflects on this discipline's relevance to design today

Teaching and Learning Methods: The module's learning outcomes can be achieved through attendance at the lectures, and recommended background reading. Attendance at lectures is actively encouraged so that students can be part of a learning discourse. Lectures are not published in their entirety in order to encourage attendance, but students who are unable to attend specific lectures are given guidance of what to read to catch up.

The activity of recording visual notes (sketching) during the lectures is regarded as a key method for attaining a knowledge and understanding of the material. It is hoped that the module will encourage students' independent interest in this key subject area, which will be manifested through independent visits to buildings and wider scholarship, although neither of these activities will be expected or assessed.

Students will be given guidance on how their final piece of writing can be of relevance to this module, and their design studio. This guidance will, where possible, also be given during formative studio assessments.

Part 3: Assessment

It is stated above that the process of making visual notes (sketches) is important in learning and understanding visual material. The individual sketch book has been chosen as an appropriate vehicle for developing this skill, and the completed sketchbooks are formally assessed as an element of the overall module assessment.

The criteria for marking these sketchbooks are:

-evidence of engaging at the lectures and understanding of the material presented.

-ability to understand and analyse the image that has been presented, rather than copying an image photographically (for example, to attempt to draw a section through a cathedral, after being presented with a series of photographs).

-care in presentation and development of technique.

The essay forms an essential part of each award's development of skills in academic writing and scholarship. It is concerned with demonstrating an understanding of how architectural history and the use of historical precedent is a vital tool in the design process, and that reading works of historical stature is an essential skill for designers

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today. Students are not assessed on their ability to design in this module, but they are given credit for demonstrating their understanding of the relevance of historical precedent, and expressing this relevance with clarity through annotated diagrams.
