	Session materials will be made available via Blackboard and students will be encouraged to use this facility to equip themselves for face-to-face sessions.
	Independent learning will cover study of the APMP curriculum, essential reading and
	engagement with project management in the student's own workplace. Learning
	gained on the course will be applied to workplace practice in so far as possible with the assessment vehicle providing a strong, formal link between the two.
