<b>Reading Strategy</b>	<p>Students are expected to identify reading relevant to their chosen research topic, with advice and support from tutors. They will be encouraged to read widely using the library search, a variety of bibliographic and full text databases, and Internet resources. Many resources can be accessed remotely.</p> <p>The development of literature searching skills is supported by a Library seminar. These level three skills will build upon skills gained by the student whilst studying at levels one and two. Additional support is available through the Library Services web pages, including interactive tutorials on finding books and journals, evaluating information and referencing. Sign-up workshops are also offered by the Library.</p>

<b>Assessment Strategy</b>	<p>Assessment strategies within the programme that this module contributes to reflect the Faculty of Art, Creative Industries and Education's philosophy which considers assessment to be part of the learning process.</p> <p>Formative and summative assessments are designed to provide the opportunity for students to understand and reflect upon their achievements, and to support the monitoring of progress by tutors and students. Assessment methods used are varied, are relevant in demonstrating achievement to both academic and industry stakeholders, and form a coherent programme of assessment which is designed to offer students the maximum opportunity to demonstrate the skills, knowledge and experience that they have gained through the course of study, as well as to support ongoing and continuous improvement in their individual creative practice and development as practitioner-researchers.</p> <p>The principle of 'learning through making' is core to learning strategies in the Department of Creative Industries – these learning activities are then expanded into and through an exploration of contemporary practice in relevant and related subject areas.</p> <p>At assessment, therefore, students are expected to present evidence of work which demonstrates engagement with the minimum number of learning hours for the module (contact and independent study hours).</p> <p>Forms of assessment used as part of the overall programme include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Presentation and participation in studio-critique</li> <li>• Poster presentation</li> <li>• Group and individual visual presentations</li> <li>• Group and individual verbal presentations</li> <li>• Written Assignments – forms of writing relevant to the creative industries, including academic/essay and industry focused/report writing</li> <li>• Group critiques</li> <li>• Peer and self-assessment</li> <li>• Evaluative and reflective outcomes, including visual, verbal and written</li> </ul> <p>Formative and summative assessment activities that involve students participating in the evaluation of presented work (their own and others') take place throughout the programme. Participation in and attendance at these sessions forms part of the assessed content of the module as a result of this.</p>
