Teaching and Learning Methods	<ul> <li>Scheduled Learning</li> <li>1 The module content and its method of assessment will be introduced via seminars that combine lectures and reflective group-work alongside one-to-one assignment support.</li> <li>2 Extension studies will take place during seminars that will revolve around paired peer observation and facilitated feedback activities and discussions.</li> <li>3 All students will have access to one-to-one tutorials during which assignment refinement and directed coaching tasks will be completed.</li> <li>4 Post-seminar directed study will highlight key research sources, methodologies and potential approaches to assignment completion whilst broadening the students' awareness of the pertinent field of study.</li> <li>Independent Learning</li> <li>Assignment completion will be supported by further online/telephone tutorials from the module leader and by access to a dedicated virtual learning environment (VLE) presence. No requirement for the purchase of set text(s) will be made and students will have full access to library services, online applications, and inter-library loans. The input of the module leader will supplement the normal library provision expected at M-level so that research sources and relevant texts will be identified to the student and issues revolving around their access to them resolved.				
	<i>Further Reading</i> Students are expected to identify all other reading relevant to their chosen topic for themselves. They will be required to read widely using the library catalogue, a variety of bibliographic and full text databases, and Internet resources. Many resources can be accessed remotely. The purpose of this further reading is to ensure students are familiar with current research, classic works and material specific to their interests from the academic literature, wider professional sources and in-house publications of related national accrediting and sports governing bodies – e.g. Sports Coach UK.
