Part 3: Assessment			
Assessment Strategy	The project is assessed visa two pieces of coursework: A Mid Term Report and a 10,000 word Dissertation Project.		
	The Mid-Term Report is used to encourage the students to have their research question and reading strategy fully formed by the end of Term 1. And, for their progress to be measured by their supervisor in order to spot any issues/problems/opportunities that may be arising. Following receipt of feedback on the Mid-Term Report, the students will begin drafting their Dissertation Project.		
	The major assessment for this module is a 10,000 word Dissertation Project, which is formed and written via independent study. The dissertation allows students to explore a question of their own choosing in depth, and to be assessed on the quality of their understanding and analysis of it.
