Part 2: Description

Overview: This Module applies a comparative approach to planning systems outside the UK. It concentrates on the member states of the European Union, and contextual issues are set out in terms of the role of the EU itself. The Module addresses the potential procedural and conceptual problems in relation to a comparative consideration of policy issues, as well as substantive aspects in relation to specific similarities and differences in spatial planning systems and policies in the states

under consideration. It also critically examines case studies of cross-boundary collaboration over major strategic developments.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: The assessment will be based upon a single task:

Written Assignment (3500 words) - A written and appropriately illustrated essay

(3500 words). The essay question will require students to demonstrate a critical

understanding of the issues raised by the module, supported by evidence drawn

from independent study into the theme of the question selected.

The essay will be assessed according to the following criteria:

Demonstration of knowledge relevant to the question set.

Student and Academic Services

Demonstration of insight grounded in independent study in response to the question.

Discussion supported by evidence from academic literature and appropriate policy/legislation.

Structure and organisation of the response.

Clarity, coherence and depth of argument and analysis.

Standard of written English and presentation, including the use of appropriate images where they enhance clarity and communication of ideas, and full and accurate referencing in accordance with the Harvard system.

Resit Written Assignment - a similar brief to that described above, which may include some topic changes.
