Learning Outcomes	<p>On successful completion of this module students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of a negotiated work place project; the internal structures of organisations and their strategic future sustainability goals, and the personal and professional skills required to be successful</li> <li>• Retrieve and utilise relevant information from a wide range of appropriate sources e.g. textbooks, websites, management magazines, journals and corporate / internal materials/resources.</li> <li>• Analyse and evaluate the linkages between “academic” theories / concepts and their application in the workplace; evaluate own strengths and weaknesses in relation to career aspirations and employability;</li> </ul>

	<p>solve work-based problems.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Clearly communicate information using a writing style and structure appropriate to the work place norms.</li> <li>• Develop the ability to work autonomously and reflect through self-appraisal. Syllabus Outline	<p>This module enables students to carry out an industry based work placement of up to 6 weeks – approximately 200 hours or live or simulated live project/s of a similar scale (200 hours) where they will gain valuable skills and knowledge surrounding their chosen specialty area. Should students undertake a placement off site then the placement time should not exceed a total of 200 hours. This is two thirds of the total hour’s effort on the module – the placement may not exceed 6 weeks.</p> <p>This will consolidate prior learning and allow students the opportunity to demonstrate both collaborative and individual best working practice within a professional environment.</p> <p>Emphasis is placed on developing personal specialty area skills.</p> <p>Upon completion of their placement or work based learning activity, students are required to complete an evaluation that aims to demonstrate the knowledge and experience they have gained.</p>
Contact Hours	<p>Contact hours on this module is limited to 10 as the time spent either ‘out’ on placement or undertaking a work based learning project will vary depending on the provider. The expectation is that the students will spend a minimum 90 hours of independent learning and up to a maximum of 200 hours undertaking placement learning.</p> <p>Contact time will include that which is mediated through the VLE. Learning and teaching resources will be available through the VLE in accordance with the Weston College HE VLE Standard. A range of interactive activities including discussion forums may also be utilised as part of contact teaching.</p>
Teaching and Learning Methods	<p>This 30 credit module may include a formal placement off site, for example on the premises of an appropriate employer - alternatively the student studying on this module will undertake live or simulated project work which could comprise several small projects, a contribution or, potentially, even completion of a larger project – the detail of the teaching and learning on this module will be placement project dependent but essentially it will involve the student receiving instructions about how to conduct the project with guidance from staff to prepare them for the experience and opportunities for tutorials. Weston College has an HE specific Work-based learning and Placements policy and procedures which informs the organisation of this <b>Placement Learning</b> module.</p>

Programme leaders and lecturers will inform students of any essential resources or texts that they are expected to purchase themselves.</p> <p>Students registered and staff teaching on this UWE programme are entitled to library membership at their partner facilities, however, access to eResources may be restricted by licencing agreements, and individuals must be responsible for finding, collecting and returning physical resources themselves. <p>Assessment Strategy</p>	<p><b>Element 1</b> Individual Presentation element (50%)</p> <p>Students will be required to carry out a professional presentation outlining their experience within a professional studio environment.</p> <p><b>Element 2-</b> individual written assignment element (50%)</p> <p>Students will be required to write an evaluative, illustrated report on their activity on the module. This will be of a professional standard of execution and demonstrating sound evaluation and reflective practice.</p> <p>Feedback (verbal and/or in writing) at regular points throughout the module provides students with a clear understanding of their progress and advice about how this can be improved. Students on placement will have a workplace mentor and the equivalent of a workplace mentor will be assigned to students conducting work based learning project work in a way other than an off-site placement – The student will be required to take the evaluation of their placement of WBL project performance into account in this written evaluation.</p>
