Teaching and learning methods: Scheduled learning includes lectures and seminars, also tutorials.

Students will typically engage in five, 3-hour interactive lecture and seminar days. Group sizes on the module vary but groups are typically up to 30. Students are also given access to bespoke, interactive learning resources for the module, containing audios, games and quizzes giving opportunities to develop knowledge and

understanding as they progress through the module. In addition, email contact with staff is available throughout the module and during scheduled tutorial time.
