Show awareness of social divisions and social diversity in relation to criminological and sociological topics (Component A, B) 2. Demonstrate knowledge of key concepts and theoretical approaches in criminology in relation to crime, deviance, social problems and victimisation, and their application (Component A and B) 3. Demonstrate knowledge of key concepts and theoretical approaches in sociology in relation to identity, culture and social order, and their application (Component B) 4. Demonstrate knowledge of criminal justice institutions and identify their role in relation to crime, crime control and social justice (Component A and B) 5. Demonstrate knowledge of social institutions and describe their role in relation to social action and social structure (Component B) 6. Identify ways in which the subjects of criminology and sociology can be distinguished from other forms of understanding and everyday explanations (Component A and B).
Syllabus Outline	The module will provide students with an overview of the following areas

Key concepts and theories in criminology and sociology 2. The role of identity and culture in social life 3. Education, social exclusion and social inequality 4. Crime, deviance and social problems in relation to class, gender, ethnicity 5. Social, cultural and legal definitions and understandings of crime 6. Profiling dangerous and risky offenders 7. Criminal justice institutions
Contact Hours	<p>The contact hours (72) are distributed in the form of lectures, seminars and workshops - tailored as needed week-on-week in format depending on the subject at hand.</p>
Teaching and Learning Methods	<p>A variety of learning approaches will be used with the aim of maximising the active engagement of students. These will include;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Lectures • Seminars • Workshops • Debates • Problem based approaches • Independent study <p>Scheduled learning: The syllabus will be delivered through interactive lectures, seminars and workshops. The lectures will be used to introduce key ideas, main concepts and substantive topics and to guide and inform student centred learning. The seminars will provide students with important opportunities to engage in debates and discuss content as well as reflect on key issues raised during lectures in more detail and depth. The workshops will be oriented towards practice-based activities.</p> <p>Independent learning: in addition to schedule learning, students will be encouraged to be independent learners by engaging in substantial and focused independent work on this module. Students will be expected to do essential reading, assignment preparation and completion etc.</p> <p>TEL: MyUWE and Blackboard, the university supported learning portal and virtual learning environment, will be used to support students' learning, conduct activities, organise and communicate learning materials. Students will be able to engage with the material, other students and members of staff through these systems and make use of the various functionalities built into them (e.g., blogs, journals, audio, video, discussion boards, wikis, etc.) as appropriate and useful for the module learning.</p> <p>These sessions constitute an average time per level as indicated in the table below.</p>

Reading Strategy

All students will be encouraged to make full use of the print and electronic resources available to them through membership of the University. These include a range of electronic journals and a wide variety of resources available through web sites and information gateways. The University Library's web pages provide access to subject relevant resources and services, and to the library catalogue. Many resources can be accessed remotely. Students will be presented with opportunities within the curriculum to develop their information retrieval and evaluation skills in order to identify such resources effectively.

Any **essential reading** will be indicated clearly, along with the method for accessing it, e.g. students may be expected to purchase a set text, be given or sold a print study pack or be referred to texts that are available electronically, etc. This guidance will be available either in the module handbook, via the module information on Blackboard or through any other vehicle deemed appropriate by the module/programme leaders.

If **further reading** is expected, this will be indicated clearly. If specific texts are listed, a clear indication will be given regarding how to access them and, if appropriate, students will be given guidance on how to identify relevant sources for themselves, e.g. through use of bibliographical databases.

A detailed reading list will be made available through relevant channels, e.g. module handbooks, Blackboard, etc.

Part 3: Assessment

Assessment Strategy	<p>The Assessment Strategy has been designed to support and enhance the development of both subject-based and generic academic skills which will support progression onto the destination Programme, whilst ensuring that the modules Learning Outcomes are attained, as described below.</p> <p>Taken as a range of complementary tasks, upon completing these three assessments each student will be able to test and demonstrate their emerging skills (exam and written) in communicating and understanding the core issues covered in the module.</p> <p>Component A: Exam 100%</p> <p>This assessment is designed to provide students with an opportunity to demonstrate and apply their knowledge and understanding of specific topics covered in the module under exam conditions. It will build on the academic writing skills developed through component B, and the writing and exam techniques developed through the Essentials of Academic Practice module (UZQRUX-30-0). It will also provide a valuable opportunity to develop undergraduate examination skills in preparation for progression to Year 1.</p> <p>Component B: 1200 word essay 100%</p> <p>The essay will provide students with an opportunity to demonstrate an in-depth knowledge on a specific topic. This assessment will test a range of the learning outcomes and will provide a valuable learning experience through demonstrating knowledge and skills which will be of benefit when progressing to undergraduate programmes in the department. The essay questions, remit, and marking scheme will be tailored to the foundational level and emphasise embedding key skills such as basic research and writing. The assessment builds on the essay writing skills developed through the Essentials of Academic Practice (UZQRUX-30-0).</p>
