Overview: This module has a thematic approach that is flexible and journeys the students through some of the key issues that span both Sociology and Criminology.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The contact hours (66) are distributed in the form of lectures, seminars and workshops - tailored as needed week-on-week in format depending on the subject at hand.

Scheduled learning:

The syllabus will be delivered through interactive lectures, seminars and workshops. The lectures will be used to introduce key ideas, main concepts and substantive topics and to guide and inform student centred learning. The seminars will provide students with important opportunities to engage in debates and discuss content as well as reflect on key issues raised during lectures in more detail and depth. The workshops will be oriented towards practice-based activities.

Independent learning:

In addition to schedule learning, students will be encouraged to be independent learners by engaging in substantial and focused independent work on this module. Students will be expected to do essential reading, assignment preparation and completion, etc.

TEL: MyUWE and Blackboard, the university supported learning portal and virtual learning environment, will be used to support students' learning, conduct activities, organise and communicate learning materials. Students will be able to engage with the material, other students and members of staff through these systems and make use of the various functionalities built into them (e.g., blogs, journals, audio, video, discussion boards, wikis, etc.) as appropriate and useful for the module learning.

These sessions constitute an average time per level.

MO6 Identify ways in which the subjects of criminology and sociology can be distinguished from other forms of understanding and everyday explanations

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: The Assessment Strategy has been designed to support and enhance the development of both subject-based and generic academic skills which will support progression onto the destination Programme, whilst ensuring that the modules Learning Outcomes are attained, as described below.

Taken as a range of complementary tasks, upon completing these three assessments each student will be able to test and demonstrate their emerging skills (exam and written) in communicating and understanding the core issues covered in

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the module.

Assessment part A: Essay and short answer written assessment (100%)

This assessment is designed to provide students with an opportunity to demonstrate and apply their knowledge and understanding of specific topics covered in the module. It will build on the academic writing skills developed through Assessment part B, and the writing and exam techniques developed through the Essentials of Academic Practice module (UZQRUX-30-0).

Assessment part B: 1200 word essay 100%

The essay will provide students with an opportunity to demonstrate an indepth knowledge on a specific topic. This assessment will test a range of the learning outcomes and will provide a valuable learning experience through demonstrating knowledge and skills which will be of benefit when progressing to undergraduate programmes in the department. The essay questions, remit, and marking scheme will be tailored to the foundational level and emphasise embedding key skills such as basic research and writing. The assessment builds on the essay writing skills developed through the Essentials of Academic Practice (UZQRUX-30-0).
