	This module will provide assessment and record of all of the RCVS Day One skills and compentences for Veterinary Nurses as well as completion of 1800 hours employment in a veterinary nursing training practice. The 1200 hours will be added to the total of 600 hours already achieved in the module titled: Introduction to clinical skills for veterinary nurses, making a total of 1800 hours. In addition the completion of all of the skils and compentencies will include (not repeat) the 30 skills already achieved in the module titled: Introduction to clinical shills for veterinary Progress Log will also be complete
