Part 2: Description

This module focuses on professional contexts in the events industry and your development of appropriate skills, knowledge and graduate attributes. The module content explores the initiating, scoping, planning and managing of live events in a range of different sectors such as community events, sports events, corporate events, entertainment events, third-sector events, and cultural events. You will have the opportunity to engage with event professionals and external organisations in planning for and researching their live events. The module explores the skills and knowledges required for events careers in a variety of different organisations and roles, ranging across charity fundraisers, community activists, meetings and conference professionals, venue managers and public sector organisations. There is a focus on policy and professional standards within the events industry, and the instrumentalist use of events to achieve economic and social inclusion impacts and outcomes.

Students have the opportunity to select specific sectors within which to focus their assessments, and these will vary according to the expertise of faculty staff and external partner events organisations. Lectures will concern events theory and practice learned across previous specialist modules while workshops will enhance learning through a focus on specific skills, tools, methodologies and applications in the management of events. The syllabus will incorporate, but not be limited to, health and safety, creativity and creative industries, risk management and assessment, special interest markets in events, events professional standards and events strategies.

The assessment is designed to provide an opportunity to both engage in and reflect critically on events practice.

Component A, Element 1 is a 1000 word portfolio within which students reflect on their development of UWE Graduate Attributes, and their wider skills and knowledge base, in relation to the development of a personal and professional development plan. Component A, Element 2 is a 2,500 word reflective report focused on the application of theory, skills and knowledge to the operations of a case-study event or event organisation. Portfolio content is developed in classroom sessions and formative feedback is both built into these activities and delivered via Blackboard following task completion. Elements 1 and 2 of Component A are submitted together.
