Module Entry requirements		Students must be in employment of a sponsoring employer who can provide the student with a placement working with vulnerable adults, children and their families.				

Part 2: Description

This module will offer the student practical skills experience and learning about the Approved Mental Health Professional role. During this module students will undertake no less than 40 days on placement within an agreed placement setting. The learning for this module will be through practical engagement in AMHP practice and supported by in placement study. Students will learn to, and reflect upon how to lead a Mental Health Act assessment, work with service users, carers, relatives and other professionals in the context of Mental Health Act work. Students will be assessed by an AMHP practice assessor based within their employing agency, as to their competence in meeting the AMHP regulations for competent practice. Students will have regular supervision with their practice assessor. Students will be formally observed in their practice during the placement by the practice assessor.

Part 3: Assessment

Students will be required to demonstrate that they have met the competence requirements as set out in Health Care and Professions Council. (2013). Criteria for education providers and registrants. London: Health and Care Professions Council.

Students will be required to produce a reflective portfolio of evidence consisting of no less than three case study analyses which reflect observed practice. These must then be mapped against the professional competencies outlined in the regulations listed above. Competence will also be demonstrated through service user and carer

feedback and evaluations of practice by a practice assessor. Within this portfolio AMHP students will be required to pass an oral viva with the local authority AMHP lead to demonstrate that they can verbally articulate the law relevant to practice. The AMHP leads will use pre-written questions which have been developed in consultation with AMHP leads from across the region and UWE academic staff. A certificate indicating successful completion of this viva must be within the portfolio to pass, and be accompanied by statements of authenticity of evidence by student and practice assessor. The portfolio must be anonymised of all identifying information relating to service users and carers.

Students will be offered formative feedback throughout, but specifically at the interim point where the practice learning team of student, assessor and university tutor will meet.
