The student will engage in investigation of a topic related to their chosen professional pathway and will utilise basic skills of exploring and scoping a topic under supervision. Included in this is an Extract from Research Journal. This allows the student to reflect on what is being learned and how this develops the student's thinking.			
	Formative feedback will come within the facilitated workshop sessions providing them with guidance on their topic which will allow for feedback from peers and staff – thus helping them to further scope and/or focus their investigation.
