Part 2: Description

This module aims at exploring and problematising the philosophical idea of Europe by focusing both on its conceptual genesis and historical development. In particular, we will investigate how reflections of modern and contemporary philosophers such as Kant, Nietzsche, Husserl, Arendt, Patočka, and Habermas addressed European reason and culture, and contributed to shaping today's idea of Europe. Great attention will also be paid to non-European philosophical critiques of the European intellectual and political paradigm with a particular focus on post-colonial studies (such as Fanon, Saïd, Spivak, among others).

Teaching will be via lectures, seminars, and/or combined lecture/seminar sessions.

Lectures are used to introduce key philosophical thinkers and texts and the problems they address. Seminars are used to examine texts closely, discuss the arguments they contain, and consider their wider philosophical significance. Students may be expected to prepare a presentation on an agreed topic and so actively contribute to the teaching and learning process.

Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

The module will be assessed via an essay (2,000 words), and an oral exam. Multiple formats that involve both

written and oral presentations will enable students to show what they have learnt during the course in different ways and to improve their communication skills. The oral exam will consist of two questions regarding authors and/or topics analysed in class.
