## Part 2: Description

This module provides a grounding in the link between theory and research, and introduces students to the key research strategies that underpin criminological research. It aims to equip students with a foundational understanding of the distinction between quantitative and qualitative research methodologies and methods of data collection. Students will learn about designing social research, the ethical considerations involved in conducting social research, and the appropriateness of a range of data collection methods as applied to different criminological problems. This provides students with a framework for engagement with the module 'Nature and Use of Research' at Level 2, as well as their dissertation at Level 3. The main topics that will be covered by this module would include:

- The Research Process
- Ways of 'knowing' and understanding the social world: Ontology(ies) and Epistemology(ies)
- Quantitative and Qualitative Methodologies
- Surveys and Questionnaires
- Interviewing
- Focus groups
- Observation
- Secondary data analysis
- Content analysis
- Participatory action research
- Case studies
- Sampling methods
- Research Ethics

## Part 3: Assessment

The assessment for this module comprises a portfolio of work that includes:

- 1. 2 x 500words summaries of the students' learning experiences from seminar sessions (such as a particular research approach or method). This will be both formative and summative in nature. Students will be able to submit a number of reflections throughout the semester, for which they will receive feedback. Students can then act upon this feedback and then resubmit two reflections of their choice (40%). (Learning Outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).
- 2. 1200words case study evaluation. Students will be asked to consider the appropriateness of, or develop an appropriate approach and design for, a piece of research as set out in the case study provided (60%). (Learning Outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

The assessment strategy for this module was selected in order to contribute to the development of key L1 skills and module learning outcomes, and to contribute to the diversity of assessment methods on the programme as a whole. The module adheres to the UWE Academic Regulations and Assessment Cycle Policy, and assessment and feedback will form a critical aspect of the students learning process in line with UWE's Assessment Cycle Policy and will follow UWE's inclusivity guidance.
