Part 2: Description

Overview: This CPD module is designed for professional practitioners taking a lead role in court work related to social care, and those supervising professional practitioners undertaking this work.

Features: Module Entry Requirements: Students must be in relevant social care statutory employment to gain access to court work such as children, adults or mental

health social work.

Students must have an existing social work professional practice qualification including CQSW, DipSW, degree or masters in social work.

Educational aims: This module aims to develop student's knowledge and critical thinking in relation to court skills and proceedings across social work contexts with children and adults.

Outline syllabus: In this module students will consider the history of the courts' systems relevant to social and health care including theory, knowledge and practice, and critically debate the historical, social and cultural construction of the court systems. This includes theories on identity, race, class, culture and equality including values and ethics. Students will explore and critically examine the roles of the judiciary and legal advocates, as well as the role of the public in the judicial system. The module will examine and evaluate the protocols for giving written and verbal evidence in the different courts, and demonstrate that thresholds for court interventions have been met. Further to this students will reflect on the practice skills needed to equip them for contemporary professional practice in court including working with adults, children and families who are subject to court processes.

Students will be encouraged to practise, discuss and evaluate the skills and knowledge for giving written evidence in relevant court settings. You will be able to engage with peer and facilitator feedback on your skills and knowledge to advance your critical self-reflection and analysis.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Scheduled learning includes lectures and seminars delivered in person or online. There is also an expectation of independent learning including engaging with essential reading and reflection, assessment preparation etc.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: The formal assessment for this module consists of: Component A: 2500 word reflective critical analysis relating to a court report completed by the student for practice. The assignment will apply learning from the module on the court process and key dilemmas for practice. Students will also submit their fully anonymised court report as an appendix to the assignment.

Formative feedback will be gained through simulation exercises relating to the

practical elements of court work skills including, giving oral evidence and responding to questions. Students will also gain formative feedback from peer group reflective discussions and academic facilitators. There is tutorial support avbailable including via writing retreat linked to the module.
