Module Entry requirements		Students must be in relevant employment to gain access to court work. Students must have an existing professional practice qualification eg Social Work or Mental Health Nurse (RMN)				

## Part 2: Description

This CPD module is designed for professional practitioners taking a lead role in court work related to social care, and those supervising professional practitioners undertaking this work. It will develop student's knowledge and critical thinking in relation to court skills and proceedings for both child and adult care. In this module students will consider the history of the courts' systems relevant to social and health care including theory, knowledge and practice, and critically debate the historical, social and cultural construction of the court systems. This includes theories on identity, race, class, culture and equality including values and ethics. Students will explore and critically examine the roles of the judiciary and legal advocates, as well as the role of the public in the judicial system. The module will examine and evaluate the protocols for giving written and verbal evidence in the different courts and demonstrate that thresholds for court interventions have been met. Further to this student's will reflect on the practice skills needed to equip them for contemporary professional practice in court including working with adults, children and families who are subject to court processes. Student's will be encouraged to practise, discuss and evaluate the skills and knowledge for giving written evidence in relevant court settings. You will be able to engage with peer and facilitator feedback on your skills and knowledge to advance your critical self-reflection and analysis

## Part 3: Assessment

The summative assessment for this module consists of two parts:

- Component A: 1500 word written court report based on a case from your own professional practice;
- Component B: 1500 word reflective critical analysis of the court process the report is prepared for and your developed understanding of the key issues within the legal process for professional practice and service users.

Formative feedback will be gained through simulation exercises relating to the practical elements of court work skills including, giving oral evidence and responding to questions. Students will also gain formative feedback through peer group reflective discussions and from academic facilitators.
