**Overview:** This module will facilitate the development of the practitioner's knowledge and skills in the core elements of paediatric pain management.

Part 4: Assessment

**Assessment strategy:** Presentation of an evidence based poster linked to an

aspect of pain management in children, followed by critical questioning as an oral

defence of the poster. The presentation and critical questioning will last a maximum

of 30 minutes, broken down into a 15 minute presentation of the poster, followed by

a 15 minute oral defence, composed of critical questions.

The poster will be assessed under controlled conditions.

The oral defence will include a minimum of two standardised questions to address

the relevant professional, legal and ethical dimensions of clinical practice. Additional

questions may be asked which are of relevance to each individual student's poster

presentation.

Assessment support will be offered throughout the module.

The poster should be fully referenced using UWE Harvard. M-level students should

refer to their evidence base and source throughout the defence of their poster.

The assessment strategy has been chosen because it reflects the increasing

practice and use within healthcare of poster presentation at interview and conference

for healthcare practitioners. This module therefore aims to reflect current practice

through its assessment strategy.
