Educational aims: Writing critically and employing scholarly arguments is central in the production of high quality business research narratives. This taught module aims

to introduce DBA students to the fundamentals of developing their skills in communicating business research.

Outline syllabus: The syllabus includes for example:

Understanding scholarly and academic communication

Searching and evaluating sources

Reading academic sources critically

Structuring academic work

Evaluating 'impact' in the context of research

Addressing ethical issues in business research

Developing scholarly writing styles

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The module takes a flexible approach to delivery methods. Depending on cohort requirements, delivery can be fully online, fully face to face, or a blended mix of the two. The module will be delivered via a series of study units; each study unit relating to a substantive area of the syllabus. Activities, plenary sessions and workshops will provide an opportunity for critical analysis, discussion and peer/tutor feedback.

These sessions may take place in the classroom, face to face; or in an online environment.

Online sessions may be:

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Synchronous (e.g. using live webinars) or

Asynchronous (e.g. using text/video discussion tools).

Indicative delivery modes:

The module has been designed for flexible delivery patterns. It can take place in a

physical environment, online environment or a blended mix. The module schedule

can be adapted to suit the needs of the cohort / partner institution and can take place

over a longer period (e.g. a term); or a shorter intensive period (e.g. all scheduled

learning over 4-5 days).

Students will critically evaluate and discuss published works and produce texts with

opportunities for peer/tutor evaluation and feedback. Activities in the module will

facilitate building cohort identity and peer support.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will

achieve the following learning outcomes.

scholarly writing

MO2 Search for, identify and critically evaluate sources

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: There are two assessment tasks for this module:

Formative assessment:

Students will participate in group discussions and workshops. These may take place

in a face-to-face or online environment. These will usually involve peer evaluation

and tutor feedback - for example critical examination/analysis of a specific research

text, or students own writing.

Summative assessment:

Task A: A scholarly written summary (1500 words).

This will require students to identify a specific business research topic relevant to

their area of work and write a critical evaluation of key sources in this research topic,

demonstrating the capacity to search a variety of scholarly sources. Students will be

given some formative feedback in the early stages of production of this assessment,

which is likely to be their first piece of work at this level, and will have opportunity to

reflect upon feedback from this assignment before Task B is due for submission.

Task B: A scholarly written report (3500 words).

A description of the proposed challenge or issue in the place of work that the student

intends to research and a justification of the relevance of this choice for the

organisation and for the student's professional and personal interests. Drawing on

conclusions from component A suggest potential theories/conceptual frameworks to

employ, consider how impact may be evaluated and include discussion of ethical

considerations relevant to this research.

Page 5 of 7 30 May 2023 The word count for these assignments reflect the need to develop concise writing skills in presenting information and to allow for the preparation time required in developing academic writing. Other methods of assessment may be employed to demonstrate the learning requirements where reasonable adjustments are required by a student.

Not assessed as part of this module: DBA students, as part of the Doctoral Development plan, should write a critical reflection on learning (1,500 words) to inform discussion with DoS. Students need to critically evaluate key personal learning outcomes from this module and how they will utilise these to inform their DBA studies.
