Part 2: Description
<p>This module is designed to help students understand the expectations of study in higher education and to introduce them to the study skills and methodological approaches in their chosen discipline and related disciplines within the field of Cultural Industries. All of these disciplines use the power of words (written or spoken) to analyse and interact with the world, and this shared emphasis of the use of language will be the main focus of the module. The module is divided into several teaching blocks delivered by staff from a variety of disciplines. They will introduce students to the ways in which language is analysed and deployed in individual disciplines, but students will also explore how these different disciplines intersect in their interests and methodologies. The use and appreciation of language is also central to an engagement with critical academic sources, and this is the other focus on the module. Library sessions and exercises will give students a solid grounding in research</p>

skills and ensure they are familiar with the resources available through the UWE library. Students will learn to find, summarise and assess suitable critical sources.

Teaching will be delivered in a variety of formats, including lectures, small and big group discussions and workshops. The module aims to develop students' ability and confidence to become independent and critical learners.

### Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

The assessment strategy is designed to support and enhance the development of core subject specific skills and transferrable study skills with an emphasis on research skills. Assessment is through coursework and an online test delivered via Blackboard.

#### Component A: Library assessment

The Library workbook, which students complete over a specified period in their independent study time, and a Blackboard test under controlled conditions test students' ability to conduct basic research using the resources of the UWE library and to observe referencing conventions.

#### Component B: 3000-word Portfolio

The Portfolio consists of two elements: 1. A selection of seminar and lecture reports, in which students synthesise the most important points that were discussed in class in a given week. This exercise allows students to demonstrate their engagement with the course content and their ability to select and condense information that was absorbed through listening and reading; 2. An annotated bibliography, focussed around a critical question related to the module's content. This exercise will encourage students to develop good research and referencing habits from the start of their academic career.
