Part 2: Description

In this module you will gain an in-depth knowledge of the International Phonetic Alphabet and how it can be applied to the study of accents of English. You will learn how to produce phonetic transcriptions of accents as well as analyse, produce and teach / coach accents.

The module also explores other pedagogical approaches to the teaching of accents enabling you to adapt to the needs of those you teach.

Teaching in the first two terms is via lectures, seminars and practical sessions. In the second and third term you will have opportunities to coach acting students in a variety of accents on a one-to-one basis and/or in groups.

Part 3: Assessment

Assessments are designed to test your knowledge of the International Phonetic Alphabet and how it can be applied to the study and practice of accents. Although theory is tested, emphasis is placed on your ability to learn to both produce and coach an accent for practical purposes (e.g., for an acting student, other speaker). Although it is expected you will learn, and coach, a number of accents throughout the course only one is formally assessed. Short, formative written tests designed to hone your listening skills will be given regularly throughout the first two terms of the module. Summative assessments will be:

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 The phonetic analysis and transcription of an accent including vowels, consonants, accentual stress and intonation. Between 500-1,000 words. (Component A, 1) A practical assessment of your ability to produce an accent in conversation, with learned text and sight reading. 20 minutes. (Component A, 2) A practical assessment of your ability to coach an accent to an acting student or other speaker. 45 minutes. (Component A, 3)
