## Part 2: Description

Educational Aims: See Learning Outcomes

**Outline Syllabus:** In this course we shall be examining a number of the discourses that emerged both at the time of the emergence of cinema, at the turn of the twentieth century, and later philosophical discourses (by authors such as Bergson, Benjamin, Lacan, Deleuze, Stiegler) which attempt retrospectively to understand cinema, its emergence and evolution. We will then apply such discourses to current film and filmmaking and produce a series of reflections on how twentieth-century philosophical analysis enables viewers to explore and assess today's products of the cinema industry. In this second phase, students will have the chance to enrich their insight into such topics by working together, and by preparing and delivering brief public presentations in contemporary films within the frame of their placement.

## Part 3: Assessment

The module will be assessed via (A) a reflective blog (2000 words) based on a 20-hour placement and (B) an oral exam.

Students will conduct their placement (either face-to-face or online) within the frame of 'Thought in Action: Conversations about Cinema' – a film series co-organised by UWE and Watershed. Their placement activities will include: attending and actively participating in the monthly screenings and debates of 'Thought in Action'; working in small teams to collect articles, reviews and materials, and generate a philosophical reflection upon one or more of the films that are going to be screened; choosing one spokesperson for each team who will deliver a short presentation of the aforementioned reflection during one of the film nights. The placement will be assessed via a series of blog entries that each student will have to write in order to share reflections on their own activities.

The oral exam will last approximately 20 minutes, and will consist of two questions – one mainly based on the analysis of philosophical theories and discourses on cinema, and one more focused on the knowledge and skills that students will acquire throughout the completion of their placement. Proceeding in this way, the examiner will be able to guarantee continuity between the theoretical and practical parts of the module.

By using multiple formats that involve both written and oral presentations, this course will enable students to fully show what they have learnt in different ways and to improve their communication skills.
