Part 2: Description

Overview: This module will provide knowledge and training in fundamental professional practices necessary to understand policing and undertake the complex police role.

Educational Aims: The aim of the module is to introduce and apply the practical and theoretical models that underpin the basic principles of police practice. It will highlight the position of the police within the wider criminal justice sector and the importance of reflective practices.

Outline Syllabus: It will cover the five compulsory strands of professional police practice set out by the College of Policing. This entails the structure and purpose of responding to calls for service (response policing); policing communities; policing the roads; how to use information and intelligence; how to conduct criminal investigations. Students will learn the essential principles of relevant legal legislation.

Teaching and Learning Methods: This module will involve some face to face teaching and independent learning alongside operational practice. This module will be delivered by face to face teaching and independent learning. Students will have informal assessment opportunities for developing work-based reports, tutorials, as well as peer-centred learning. Apprentices will be able to engage in formative quizzes related to policing skills throughout the module, including

using aspects of online learning from the College of Policing managed learning environment (MLE).

While this module is delivered as a 'standard module' apprentices will continue to complete a placement-based portfolio documenting occupational competencies in order to achieve Independent Patrol Status. While this is not assessed within the module, this must be completed within 52 weeks of beginning the PCDA program and is a gateway requirement to progress to year two.

Part 3: Assessment

Summative assessment:

Component A:

15-minute court skills presentation, visually and audibly recorded.

Apprentices will identify a policing incident from their tutorship, or post-tutorship, which was recorded in their pocket note book. Apprentices will be required to explain their actions and decision-making processes, in response to a series of set questions, using and citing relevant sources as well as the National Decision Model (NDM).

Rationale:

This will assess the underpinning theoretical aspects of the module relating to policing as well as allowing apprentices to be assessed on their ability to apply knowledge in practice. This is a key way that learned academic aspects are practically applied.

Formative assessment:

Apprentices will be able to engage in formative quizzes related to policing skills throughout the module, including using aspects of online learning from the College of Policing managed learning environment (MLE). Apprentices will receive feedback on a series of practical tasks that that they will complete during the module. They will also received feedback during tutorials.
