Part 2: Description

This module will provide knowledge and training in fundamental professional practices necessary to understand policing and undertake the complex police role.

It will cover the five compulsory strands of professional police practice set out by the College of Policing. This entails the structure and purpose of responding to calls for service (response policing); policing communities; policing the roads; how to use information and intelligence; how to conduct criminal investigations.

Students will learn the essential principles of relevant legal legislation, such as the Public Order acts and relate this to the work they are undertaking in the five strands of professional practice above.

Alongside this, students will learn about professional standards, how to maintain them and what evidence exists to identify their importance to organisational and individual practice.

This module will involve some face to face teaching and independent learning alongside operational practice in the form of a tutorship. Students will have informal assessment opportunities for developing work-based reports, presenting work from the witness box in a mock court, as well as peer-centred learning.

Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

Summative assessment

Component A

Practice will be assessed via an Occupational Competency Portfolio within PebblePad. Learning outcomes and performance criteria, which meet the Guidelines for Occupational Competence as set out by the College of Policing, will be used for the practice assessment.

In partnership with their employer, apprentices will use a bespoke portfolio to evidence a number of practical skills relevant to achieving independent patrol status under the supervision of their tutor constable. The tutor constable or assessor will then mark off on the document when the apprentice has demonstrated competence in the relevant task or duty.

Rationale: This assessment will enable apprentices to consistently demonstrate the basic practical skills they will need to undertake operational policing roles. It therefore works to help support the apprentice in their learning and act as a key bridge between academic knowledge and skills, and practical competencies and implementation of knowledge in practice. It also helps build their Occupational Competency Portfolio (OCP) needed for achieving independent patrol status and passing their end point assessment at year 3.

Component B

10 minute cross examination in a UWE Courtroom. Using an agreed incident from their work experience which was recorded in their pocket book. Apprentices will be required to take the stand and explain their actions and decision making processes using relevant knowledge gained from the module as well as the National Decision Model (NDM)

Rationale: This will assess the underpinning theoretical aspects of the module relating to policing as well as allowing apprentices to be assessed on their ability to apply knowledge in practice. This is a key way that learned academic aspects are practically applied.
