Part 2: Description

This module would introduce you to an operational design practice and require you to act professionally in order to deliver real projects on site within a working design team.

In this module you will give your real-world experience in a working interior design practice. You will learn to apply everything you have learned so far in the programme within live projects. You will be exposed to a professional working environment working within design teams on live design schemes. You will meet clients and work to deadlines as appropriate to the interior design industry.

You will cover: Professional Skills Application of technical skills you have developed on the programme so far Time management Multi-tasking Producing CAD drawings Production of presentation materials, design communication and delivering concepts and ideas to a wider team and clients. Outline the assessment strategy for the module by;

You will be assessed on a body of work including 2 main components: Portfolio and Written Assignment Portfolio

You will produce a portfolio of all of the work you produced during your time in placement Your portfolio will be accompanied by a signed cover sheet from your employer to confirm that all work has been produced during your time in practice. This cover sheet will also include a reference letter.

Written Assignment

You will produce an illustrated 3000 word presentation document that discusses:

- How you applied all of your learning from the programme during your time in practice
- What new skills you have developed during your time in practice
- How your work placement will benefit you as you progress into your final year on the programme
- What you have learnt about yourself and future career path as a result of your time in practice.

These assessment requirements have been specified in order to assess:

Portfolio:

Your professional development and the improvement of your design ability. The production of a portfolio will challenge you to present to a high standard as well as test your ability to critically edit your work for the production of a professional standard document.

The covering letter and reference from your employer will also ensure you have operated professionally with a strong work ethic.

Written Assignment

You will be required to think critically about your time on the programme prior to your employment on the placement year, your time during the placement and reflect on how this will help you achieve your goals. This document will test your written skills, your ability to present well illustrated and professionally composed documentation and will push you to plan how you may approach your final major project in your final design module UADASR: Extended Study in Interior Design.

- The covering letter and reference is essential as proof that you have contributed to all of the work in your portfolio and to avoid any issues from plagiarism. Your written assignment should be self-reflective and so should be personal to you. As a result the document may be subject to plagiarism testing with the relevant software.
- A sandwich year tutor will be appointed to monitor your progress and you will be required to have several meetings/conference calls with them throughout the course of the sandwich placement. The tutor will also have regular contact with a member of staff/employer in the design practice of your work placement to receive feedback on your progress.
