Part 2: Description
<p>This module enhances and refines the understanding of the relationship between literature and colonialism you gained at level 1.</p> <p>The module focuses on two broad areas: on the one hand, the ways in which literary texts written during the period of the British Empire represent and reflect on the structures and ideology of colonialism; on the other hand, how writers from the colonies (or former colonies) use literary texts to reflect the experience of being colonial subjects and to contest the ideology of colonialism. You will study texts from different genres, such as fiction and drama for example, and from a period ranging from the 18<sup>th</sup> century to the 21<sup>st</sup> century and from different countries. You will approach these texts using concepts drawn from postcolonial theory.</p>

<b>Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details</b>		
<p>The assessment for this module builds on your work at level 1 and asks you to engage critically with the concepts of postcolonial theory and with relevant literary texts. The assessment also enhances your ability to research critical and primary sources using the tools available via UWE's Library.</p> <p>For your assessment, you will compile an anthology of primary texts on a theme consistent with the contents and approaches of the module. You will select 5 extracts or short texts, of which up to 4 can be from those studied on the module, to include in the anthology; you will write a 1000-word critically-informed Introduction; you will then close-read two of the extracts (500 words x 2).</p> <p>As well as meeting the learning outcomes for the module, this assessment format ensures that you continue to develop the skills (critical engagement, close reading, research) essential for your degree as a whole.</p>
