Part 2: Description

Overview: This module will introduce you to a vast and varied range of children's literature published between the mid nineteenth century and the beginning of the First World War.

Outline syllabus: In this module you will examine how children's literature begins to evolve from didacticism towards a more liberal and at times, radical, stance. While many texts on the module may at first appear conservative we will ask questions about their constructions of fatherhood, family, women, class and colonialism. We will consider the ever-changing construction of the child alongside the wider context of the period. Bearing in mind, at all times, how children's literature, read by increasing numbers of children and adults at this time has the potential to shape generations of people and literature that follow it.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: In its three hours of time per week the module will take the form of lecture, seminar and workshop. The lecture will supply key information concerning text and wider context. The seminar will concentrate on facilitating group discussion and will tend to focus on close textual analysis. The workshop will provide opportunities for you to carry out various practical exercises and/or suggest ways in which you can approach texts with different theoretical lenses. We will consider the influences these texts continue to have by looking at more contemporary adaptations potentially including film and/or abridged/ updated versions.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Assessment will consist of a 2500 word portfolio. Within this portfolio you will be asked to perform various tasks which may include but are not limited to:

A close reading, an article on textual adaptations, a review of an adaptation, a critique of illustrations, a critical review of a relevant secondary essay/book/journal article.

This assessment will test your understanding of the development, construction and contextual detail of children's literature in this period. It will enable you to demonstrate how children's literature is an ever-changing field that is constantly reworked and rewritten. It will enable you to conduct scholarly research and to produce writing that summarises and evaluates other critics/adaptations. It will allow you to work to your own strengths and produce a piece of writing that can be scholarly or tailored to more mainstream reader. This portfolio will prepare you for an increased level of academic freedom in the third year.
