## Part 2: Description

**Overview:** Pre-requisites: Students must have taken one out of UPGPPU-30-1 Literature and Ideas, OR UPGP6J-30-1 Genre and Creative Writing, OR UPGND6-30-1 Literature and the Marketplace.

**Educational aims:** See Learning Outcomes

**Outline syllabus:** This module investigates literary representations of slavery within the Age of Revolution which includes the periods of the American and French Revolutions and Romanticism. The way in which the themes and debates surrounding slavery were expressed through different genres such as slave narratives, abolitionist poetry and Gothic novels will be analysed and critically interrogated. The literary significance of place, such as the role played by cities such as Bristol in the trans-Atlantic slave trade and how that is reflected by writers, will be scrutinised. Theoretical perspectives will be developed to consider the representation of the racially other and the implications of gender in the readings of texts. Historic contextualisation will advance the understanding of how specific texts intervened in contemporary debates relating to equality, identity and freedom.
