## Part 2: Description

**Overview**: Students must have taken one out of UPGPPU-30-1 Literature and Ideas, OR UPGP6J-30-1 Genre and Creative Writing, OR UPGND6-30-1 Literature and the Marketplace

Educational Aims: See Learning Outcomes

**Outline Syllabus:** This module introduces you to the richness and diversity of late-sixteenth early seventeenth-century English literature. We cover a wide range of genres and sub-genres in order to familiarise you with a period long famed for its explosion of literary forms and styles, including the sonnet, epic, satire, country-house poem, city comedy, and revenge tragedy. A different text will usually be studied every week in order to enable you to read as much as possible in the literature of this period, and to forge connections between the material studied.

The texts have also been selected in order to allow you to explore a range of recurring (and often pressing and contested) topics in Renaissance literature, such as religious self-examination, courtliness, self-fashioning, overseas travel, and understandings of cultural difference and of self vs. other. Whilst our main focus is on canonical texts (by, for example, Marlowe, Jonson and Donne) we also study writings that have previously been overlooked by literary scholars but that have recently begun to attract critical attention (such as methods for, and position papers on, travel).

## Part 3: Assessment

The written assignment focuses your attention on close textual analysis of Renaissance literature. It may include:

The close reading of one or more passages from the set reading on the module, in which you will need to demonstrate not only an in-depth analysis of the language of the passage in question, but also an understanding of the literary text from which the extract is taken;

and

A short critical extract that examines one of the module's set texts, in which case you may be required to demonstrate your comprehension of the extract and to articulate your own critical position in relation to it, drawing on your own readings of the primary text in question.
