**Educational aims:** Building on the critical and contextual study of animation delivered at Level one, this module focuses on sectors and genres of animation. The purpose of this module is to deepen critical engagement with animation across a variety of significant and innovative platforms (e.g. Animated Documentary).

Page 2 of 7 03 July 2023 Research skills will be extended through assignments and activities that complement and challenge as well as advance critical thinking. This will include the study of texts and the production of a film essay (documentary) as textual research. This assessable component will be a group assignment that critically examines an animation artefact in relation to genre, audience, reception and wider academic discourses.

The module handbook will give detailed guidance in relation to assignments. UWE Library Services will provide workshops in support of research methods. Individual support for writing assignments is available from UWE Study Support.

### Part 4: Assessment

### Assessment strategy: Assessment Strategy

The assessment type has been chosen to enable students to demonstrate achievement across all the learning outcomes of the module, to provide flexibility in

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selecting appropriate and specific outputs and to facilitate engagement with research activities, which is the focus of the module's learning outcomes. Evidence of enquiry, initiative, analysis and the articulation of findings will be the core focus of assessment. Assessment strategies will include presentations and written work supported by evidence of research.

### Formative Assessment

Peer review and formative assessments are embedded in each research assignment and may take the form of presentations, debates and coursework support sessions. This will enable staff to support enquiry and encourage critical engagement and to provide students with a clear understanding of their progress and how this can be improved. In addition, students will be expected to contribute to the constructive critical evaluation of fellow students' work for formative feedback.

Summative Assessment

Assessment 1: Portfolio (100%)

Detailed guidance on assessment will be provided in the Module Handbook and assignment briefs. Examples of portfolio contents are:

Group Film: this project involves negotiated decision-making, peer-learning and collaboration in the production of a short research film on an aspect of animated filmmaking or an animation artefact.

Individual Supporting Material: a portfolio of primary and secondary research (for example, on wider economic and cultural issues, and to critical discourses and debates) and draft materials evidencing the individual contribution to the group film plus evaluation of the finished film including how their discoveries will contribute to their own development.

Peer assessment.

Assessment Criteria (as related to learning outcomes) Students will be assessed using the following criteria:

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Research and Creative development (MO1, MO2, MO3, MO4, MO5, MO6, MO7): The level and use of research methods, discursive thinking and debate in support of enquiry, investigation, editorial development and narrative design;

Contextual and Critical Analysis (MO1, MO2, MO3, MO4, MO6, MO7): The range of knowledge and understanding demonstrated in research assignments; the level of critical engagement with identified topics, their wider context, critical theory, themes and ethical considerations;

Audience engagement and storytelling (MO1, MO4, MO5, MO6, MO7): The level to which the film essay is imaginative, communicative and structured for a defined audience; Dissemination: the ability to mediate, structure and communicate in film and written outputs;

Design, craft and technical skill (MO2, MO3, MO4, MO5, MO7): Synthesis of ideas and research for design and sequential construction with modes of production, duration and other constraints; Knowledge and application of a range of relevant production methods, and development of relevant design and craft skills;

Professional Practice (MO3, MO4, MO5, MO6, MO7): The level and ability to mediate, structure and communicate research findings in presentations and written outputs clearly and coherently, and the use of scholarly conventions.
