Part 2: Description

The primary aim of this module is the exploration of the Criminal Justice System in England and Wales. This involves a discussion of the philosophies that inform it, the institutions that comprise it, the individuals that engage in various ways with it, and the processes that are implicit within it.

The syllabus comprises an introduction to the mechanics of the criminal justice system with a particular focus on the key institutions and key processes.

In partnership with the academic content, the module provides an opportunity for students to develop key skills relevant to study at HE and additional employability and study skills that are important in their path to becoming ready and able graduates, which is a key priority of UWE Bristol Strategy 2020.

The main topics that will be covered by the module include:

- Police
- Courts

- Sentencing
- Prisons
- Alternatives to Custody
- Probation
- Youth Justice System
- Models of Justice

Part 3: Assessment

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The assessment strategy for this module has been designed to support and enhance the development of the learning outcomes. As such assessments are designed to underpin students' academic learning and skills acquisition in the module and to provide for learning beyond the material delivered in the classroom.

Component A comprises of a single 1 hour multiple choice exam which takes place during the final assessment period of the academic year.

The coursework components of the assessment (component B) comprise a 1500 word court report. This seeks to test students understanding of the courts as a key institution in the criminal justice process, alongside their writing and referencing skills.

These assessment types have been chosen because they complement the approach of other modules which are delivered in the subject group at Year 1. The court report specifically is a novel introductory assessment and due to its practical nature is both an exciting way for students to be introduced to the workings of the criminal justice system, but also provides students with content upon which to reflect and link to theory. This is considered to be a better practice than a heavily theoretical assessment, which could be potentially alienating to students in light of this being one of their first HE level assessments.

Opportunities for formative assessment are embedded in the module teaching and take a variety of forms; students will have access to exam questions in relation to component A, and reflection opportunities in relations to their court observations as relevant to component B.

Assessment criteria will be made available to students in the module guidance given at the start of term.
