**Educational aims:** The primary aim of this module is the exploration of the Criminal Justice System in England and Wales. This involves a discussion of the philosophies that inform it, the institutions that comprise it, the individuals that engage in various

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ways with it, and the processes that are implicit within it.

In partnership with the academic content, the module provides an opportunity for students to develop key skills relevant to study at HE and additional employability and study skills that are important in their path to becoming ready and able graduates, which is a key priority of UWE Bristol Strategy 2020.
