Part 2: Description

The confidence and ability to think critically, apply knowledge and skills, and provide expert, evidence-based, nursing care lies at the centre of nursing practice. This module offers final year nursing students to consider long term career pathways prior to registration. Reflecting that enquiry and exploration are at the heart of the Future Nurse curriculum, this module has a particular focus on evidence and principles that underpin children and young people's palliative nursing care delivery and the role of the nurse in influencing and contributing to the processes of organisational change in improving care delivery for individuals through an awareness of national and international policies

This module will use a range of learning and teaching strategies to support student learning and will include:

- Lectures
- Scenario based teaching through interaction
- Group work
- Self-directed learning
- Digital learning delivered through Blackboard and other virtual learning platforms

Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

The assessment strategy for this module is designed to allow a diverse range of students to be able to explore their own current and future practice focusing on an existing and or emerging model of care.

Formative assessment: Students will be given the opportunity to have feedback on an assignment plan to inform the final assessment

Summative assessment: The assignment is by way of a 2000 word case study of a child or young person diagnosed with a life-limiting condition, who now requires palliative care. This should be a critical analysis including defining palliative care, assessment and care planning for the child, young person and family including the psychological impact indicating deficits and recommendations for future nursing delivery. Appropriate literature should be used to support all areas of discussion.
