Part 2: Description

Increasingly, ethical professional practice in counselling and psychotherapy requires sufficient research awareness to enable you to access continuing professional development opportunities and evaluate research relevant to your practice.

The application of scientific research methods in counselling and psychotherapy is not uncontroversial, as there is good reason to believe that therapy is like an art or craft that evolves in response to the creativity and spontaneity of the co-created relationship. With this in mind, the module adopts a methodological pluralism that acknowledges the multifaceted and contextualised approach to research inquiry in counselling and psychotherapy. You will be introduced to both quantitative and qualitative research methods, and develop the ability to evaluate and critique evidence relevant to your practice in counselling and psychotherapy.

Scheduled teaching and learning will consist of workshops, tutorials and online materials introducing the key research methods used in counselling and psychotherapy. You will be mentored, by a research supervisor, in formulating a proposal which describes a manageable (i.e., in terms of resources, time, etc.) piece of work. This will help you to reflect carefully on the ethical implications for both you, the inquirer and participants (if any) before embarking on the research itself. The research proposal will further help you consider what steps are necessary to ensure you conduct your research in an ethically sound manner, by ensuring for example the confidentiality and wellbeing of researcher and research participant(s) alike. The research proposal will also provide you with the foundations to then carryout a feasible, independent study and support you in demonstrating the application of research methods in a counselling context through the completion of a research report.

Typically, you can expect to meet with your research supervisor on a monthly basis throughout the academic year.

Part 3: Assessment

Students will be expected to produce a substantial research project of 5,000 words (or equivalent) focussing on an identified topic relating to counselling practice. This may take the form of an empirical research project (e.g. using focus groups, questionnaires semi-structured interviews, interviews on a particular topic), systematic review or extended systematic case study informed by wide current understandings in the discipline. The research assignment provides evidence of the learner's ability to apply both ethically and methodologically appropriate methods in a counselling and psychotherapy context. The report will be based on research methods introduced at the commencement of the module.

Students will be able to submit a draft of their projects for tutor comments and can use this feedback to inform their assessment submission.
