Part 2: Description

This module will build on the skills acquired in the Children's Theatre Touring module and will include acting, singing, movement, combat and text study. This will be demonstrated by a short Theatre in Education (TIE) tour to Key Stage 2 pupils. You will be introduced to the practice of Theatre in Education touring and the requisite skills, procedures and disciplines of such work. You will work with an internal director or external theatre practitioner over a period of usually three weeks in order to create, polish and devise an effective piece of informative, entertaining and educational drama. You will be expected to draw on your experience as an ensemble player in order to realise the piece and investigate further elements of the actor audience relationship.

Students will have the opportunity to learn through feedback from tutors in rehearsals, workshops and group classes.

Scheduled learning includes rehearsals and workshops, supervised time in the studio and work with specialist teachers in voice, movement and singing.

Independent learning includes engagement with essential reading, research preparation and presentation.

Part 3: Assessment

This is a Professional Practice module with only one component of assessment. This component has a number of elements of assessment and which overall are Pass/Fail.

Assessment Strategy

To pass this module you must successfully pass each of the elements listed below.

You will be assessed on your understanding of and ability to apply and develop a more advanced acting technique and performance skills in theatre-in-education. This will include assessment of your contribution to a touring company and your competency in more advanced stage management skills. Formative feedback will be provided throughout the duration of the project by the director together with feedback on the summative assessment covering process and performance at the conclusion of the work. The examination of the differing levels of engagement for a slightly older audience allows the student to build on previous experience of the Children's Theatre module and to further enhance the relationship between fellow performers on stage and the audience.
