#### Part 2: Description

This module is designed to enable you to develop the potential of your voice to express your acting choices. You will learn the anatomy and physiology of the voice, how to use your voice creatively, appropriately and sustainably in different playing spaces and media. You will learn how to identify and approach the structure and content of different types of text including rhetoric and verse. You will learn techniques that will enable you to 'embody' the voice including Laban and Animal Studies. You will learn phonetics – the study of meaningful sound – and how to use this as a tool to learn accents. You will also be supported in your voice, text and dialect work across the modules that run concurrently with this one acting Performance Technique and Physical Movement.

Most of the module is taught in group practical sessions. Some theory is taught to support the practical work. One-to-one sessions help consolidate the group work and provide time for specific and detailed work tailored to the individual.

With guidance from a tutor you are required to keep a journal reflecting on learning points and detailing practical work and approaches you may draw on throughout your career.

In order to fulfil your individual potential you can expect to receive detailed feedback from your voice and dialect tutors during classes, internal auditions, text projects and public performances. This is usually immediate and verbal and it is important that you find a way of recording this feedback either in a notebook, your reflective journal and/or an audio recording. At the end of the module you will receive a written report which summarises your progress and attainment. For the feedback to be effective you need to reflect on it and take appropriate action. More details about how feedback will be invaluable to you will be given by your tutors during your first few classes.					
Part 3: Assessment					
Assessment Strategy					
To pass this module you must successfully pass each of the elements listed below. If you fail an element you will need to re-sit it.					
While the emphasis is on continuous development throughout the year, there are four summative assessment points. The first is at the end of the second term and takes the form of a practical presentation of Shakespearean verse speaking. This requires you to put into practice creative, appropriate and sustainable vocal use and your practical understanding of verse speaking.					
The second, comes towards the end of the third term and takes the form of an independently researched and practiced text presentation. This requires you to draw on all the skills learned throughout the module, including voice, text and dialects, to produce a short performance piece.					
The third, again towards the end of the third term, is a practical presentation of your voice and movement work which we call Embodied Voice. Guidance is provided by both a voice and a movement tutor.

In addition, formative assessment and feedback is given by Voice Department tutors at all performance opportunities across all modules throughout the year including text projects, internal auditions and stage combat assessments.
