Part 2: Description

Illegal Drugs: Problems, Markets and Policy will introduce students to the 'drug problem' from both a national and international perspective. The module will take a criminological perspective to understand the 'drug problem', but it will also introduce students to key contributions from sociology, economics, international relations and critical policy studies. The module draws on a range of theoretical and conceptual ideas to make sense of illegal drugs within a globalising world. The topics covered on this module will include;

- Local, national and international drug markets.
- Illegal drugs, drug problems and consumer societies.
- Illegal drugs, drug problems and producer societies.
- National, European and international drugs policy.
- Critical drugs policy analysis.

The module will be taught through weekly lectures, seminars and independent study time. Students will be encouraged to read widely and critically reflect upon contemporary developments in the world of drug policy.

Part 3: Assessment

Component A

The module has one component of summative assessment in the form of a 2500 word case study. The assessment will support the student in achieving all three module learning outcomes.

Rationale

The case study will provide students with an opportunity to develop a critical understanding of the broader issues concerning the local, national and global nature of the drug problem, drug markets and relevant drug policy responses. The case study structure fits well with the design and delivery of module content, and will provide an effective way of assessing the breadth and depth of student learning.

Students will also be directed to use SafeAssign UWE's online plagiarism software before submitting their work so that any potential issues can be identified and addressed before work is submitted.
